Keeping the 'sunny' in Sunnybank



Happy New Year to all the Friends of Sunnybank Park!

As we see daylight increase and the Park emerge from the ice and snow, we're delighted to tell you that we have finally signed the **Lease** for the Park! We can now begin the real work of redeveloping the Park and seeing this lovely greenspace emerge as a vital part of the local communities lives.

Over the autumn we have had a few exciting 'goings on' in the park – one of which has been Primary 5/6 from Sunnybank School enjoying four sessions of **Forest School** with the support of Aberdeen Countryside Rangers, Stephen and Simon. This involved encouraging the young people to observe, listen and enjoy the area, including all manner of activities like: nature art, bird watching and, best of all, shelter building!

Events carried on in the Park right through until November, with litter picks, pruning (usually with food as a vital part of the mix!), some story sharing and one HUGE bulb planting session – look out for a mass of colour appearing from the ground shortly! Thanks to all who have been supporting these gatherings, it has been fun to meet those of you who've come, and exciting working with you all to see our Park grow. There will be many more opportunities to have a face to face with more of you as we move forward!

Sunnybank Park - it's worth it! We know it! You know it! We are going to prove it!

We've been working with Greenspace Scotland (the national agency for greenspace) in a Government funded pilot programme: 'Greenspace is good – so prove it'. This involves 12 community greenspace groups demonstrating the benefits of their projects using the 'Social Return on Investment' (SROI) approach. This aims to show that for every £1 invested, a greater amount of 'social value' is produced. It will quantify this social value in £s, and document the range of benefits that the projects provide for their communities, the people and organisations supporting them.

We've been focusing on the range of benefits delivered by the variety of community events to be held in the Park over the course of 18 months. These events include our Sunny Day Picnics, volunteer, school and nature and wildlife events, healthy walks and so on. We think these events and activities are a great way to help to create more connected and cohesive local communities, improve people's health and wellbeing and provide new learning and skills. We are compiling evidence to demonstrate this and will produce a report in early 2011 with the results.

This will help us to prove that Sunnybank Park is a vital local greenspace. It will help us to generate support in our efforts to look after and protect the Park.

What now?

Now we have secured the lease, all that hard work behind the scenes will start to show on the ground. Work on the Sunnybank Park **Allotments** has already begun! New fencing should already be in as you read this. It may seem severe at first, but it will be painted green and softened with native planting. Inside there will be raised beds on one part of the former bowling green. And, over the hedge on the former putting green there will be traditional dug beds. There will also be a composting toilet, storage containers, a pond and a shelter. Plots have not yet been allocated. We'll be in touch with potential plotters soon!

Aberdeen Greenspace Trust are already getting underway with the **access and wildlife improvements**; paths, fences, gates, a boardwalk over the marsh area, a pond, benches and other work. BTVC (British Trust for Conservation Volunteers) have also started their **Green Gym** volunteer programme in the Park. They are actively recruiting local volunteers to help! They will be in the Park most Mondays doing Park maintenance and specific improvement projects: creation of seating areas, bird feeders, nesting boxes, information boards, a composting area and much much more. etc. They will be providing training too.
